

## Utah's 2008 Title II Formula Grants

**Background:** These grants are funded through the Title II Formula Grant from the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention to create new and effective delinquency prevention/intervention programs. Projects may receive up to four years of declining funds.

<i>Juvenile Justice Services/ JJDP Act Compliance Monitoring</i>	Monitors Utah's compliance with JJDP Act core requirements. Includes monitoring juvenile lock-ups, facilities and temporary holding facilities.	On-going	\$84,300
<i>Juvenile Justice Services/ Juvenile Jail Removal</i>	Funds ensure that minors are not locked up in adult facilities. Covers costs of transporting youth to juvenile facilities.	On-going	\$19,500
<i>U of U CJC/ Outcome Evaluation</i>	Outcome evaluation for all of the UBJJ projects providing direct services to youth. Uses pre & post tests of risk/protective factors and Youth Outcome Questionnaires.	On-going	\$50,680
<i>Poder Para La Familia Hispana/ Ocho Pasos (8 Steps)</i>	Targets gang-affiliated and gang-involved Hispanic youths in Juvenile Court with classes for them and their families during the school year. Curriculum covers 8 areas of need.	4 Final	\$8,250
<i>Boys &amp; Girls Clubs of Brigham City/ Technology Literacy</i>	350 struggling students, age 11-18, will increase grades, attendance, improve literacy levels, and gain career experience in digital applications and multimedia. Parents will also receive literacy training.	4 Final	\$24,418
<i>South Summit Healthy Community Coalition/ South Summit Mentoring &amp; Tutoring</i>	Provides mentoring and tutoring services in an after school format for youth 5-14 yrs. of age. Also includes life skills, creativity and physical fitness activities.	4 Final	\$28,000
<i>Colors of Success/ Family &amp; Youth Connections</i>	Targets families of clients involved in substance abuse treatment in SL County. Program focus on youth 6-12 years of age. Utilizes SAMSAH approved curriculum in weekly meetings.	4 Final	\$20,125
<i>Children's Service Society/ Grandfamilies</i>	Expands program to Tooele County by providing support for children in kinship placements and their care givers. Aims to prevent substance abuse and delinquency among participating youth.	3	\$30,000
<i>Salt Lake County Youth Services/ Discovering Possibilities Program</i>	Serve 30 girls referred by JJS Early Intervention and Juvenile Court, between ages 13 & 17 with a 12 week program. There will be 7-9 hours per week of psycho-educational curriculum (Girls' Circle), case management, mentoring and community service.	3 Final	\$27,500
<i>Colors of Success/ The Dream Team</i>	Serves 50 minority females ages 12-17 in the Ogden area. Includes: life skills, case management educational/recreation activities, service-learning projects & mental health services (as needed). Parents are invited to attend activities. Modeled after the Strengthening Families Program.	3	\$56,250
<i>Juvenile Justice Services/ Protective &amp; Risk Assessment (PRA) Enhancement for Females</i>	Develop a gender-specific risk assessment tool as an enhancement to PRA, for girls. Will be used by juvenile court and JJS line staff to serve about 485 girls.	3 Final	\$17,500
<i>Child &amp; Family Empowerment/ Polynesian Young Women's Life Skills</i>	12-week workshop providing Polynesian girls behavioral, thinking and communication skills to help them understand how to be true to themselves in the midst of strong cultural and family pressure. Referrals come from probation, Juvenile Justice Services, and other community organizations.	3	\$29,000

## Utah's 2008 Title V Community Prevention Grants

**Background:** Funded through the Title V Community Delinquency Prevention Grant from the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention. Grants may only be made to units of local government and are limited to 3 years of funding. Subgrantees must complete OJJDP training and community needs assessments to qualify for this grant.

## Utah's FY 2008 Gang Mini-Grants

**Background:** These grants are funded by the State of Utah for projects aimed at reducing gang activity. Projects are funded on a year-to-year basis at a maximum of \$20,000.

<i>Juvenile Justice Services Education First</i>	Partner with local faith-based organization to present Education First program to 160 Hispanic youth. Aims to reduce overall school drop-out rate, number of Hispanic youth documented as gang members and the overrepresentation of minority youth in the juvenile justice system.	\$20,000
<i>NeighborWorks Salt Lake YouthWorks Camp Anytown</i>	Forty-five high-risk SLC youth ages 14-18 will be employed by YouthWorks and participate in 16 workshops focusing on job training, prevention education and life skills. Participants will then attend a six day Camp Anytown.	\$20,000
<i>Big Brothers Big Sisters of Utah BBBS Mentoring</i>	Create 27 new, quality mentorship pairs in Wasatch, Washington and Weber County using the BBBSU community-based mentoring program.	\$20,000
<i>Boys &amp; Girls Clubs of Weber-Davis Teens Mentoring Youth</i>	25 Teen Keystone Club students will mentor 100 students from Central Middle School (closed in June '07) as they transfer to new schools. Strengthens ties to the community and positive peers.	\$20,000

## Utah's FY 2008 Juvenile Accountability Block Grants

**Background:** These grants are funded through the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency to improve accountability within the juvenile justice system. The Utah Commission on Criminal and Juvenile Justice makes grant funding decisions. The bulk of the grant funds are retained by the state to improve the juvenile justice system. There is no funding time limitation for these grants.

<i>Division of Juvenile Justice Services/</i> Graduated Sanctions/Community Programs	Covers the placement costs of approximately 16.5 “medium level of care” and “highest level of care” placement slots (including juvenile sex offenders) over a period of 6 months (Oct.1, 2007 – March 31, 2008). Calculations show that the average daily placement cost is about \$125 per day. The total amount of this grant will purchase approximately 3,025 placement days. Out-of-state placements are expected to comprise over 50% of the total paid placements.	\$340,245
<i>Administrative Office of the Courts/</i> Third District Juvenile Court Commissioner	Of the 22,000 referrals heard in Third District Juvenile Court, a Commissioner could have heard an estimated 5,500. Judges’ heavy workloads will be reduced by allowing a half time Commissioner to now take back about 1,500 cases from the Judges, thus reducing case filings.	\$81,628
<i>Administrative Office of the Courts/</i> Court Programs Evaluation & Improvement	Develop a continuous outcome evaluation and quality improvement process to create and maintain state supervision programs that are effective and efficient at holding juvenile offenders accountable while reducing recidivism. Additionally, the project will train 50 staff about evidence-based practices. Fifteen managers will be trained on program management to effectively integrate this new approach in their local court district.	\$91,041
<i>Administrative Office of the Courts/</i> Delinquency Guidelines Model Court	The National Council on Juvenile and Family Court Judges will train Third District Juvenile Court on the 16 key principles of the <i>Delinquency Guidelines</i> . Conduct an assessment of how Third District compares to the 16 key principles. An action plan will be developed to implement the key principles identified as being the most beneficial to improving court practices. An effort to pilot one or more of the key principles will also occur.	\$54,599
<i>Administrative Office of the Courts/</i> PO/DPO Safety and Management Training	Deliver 13 safety training classes to POs and DPOs that includes non-violent crisis intervention, searches, handcuffing, transporting, and other safety issues. Also, train 90 managers on evidence based practices and survival skills for middle management. Evaluate the effectiveness of trainings provided.	\$70,000
<i>Administrative Office of the Courts/</i> Motivational Interviewing	Integrate the evidence-based practice of motivational interviewing into existing case planning. Juvenile court managers (trial court executives, probation chiefs, and supervisors) will understand and demonstrate motivational interviewing skills. Improve skill level of juvenile justice partner agencies in responsivity for PRA administration.	\$35,000
<i>Administrative Office of the Courts/</i> Juvenile Court Report Card	A Report Card to the Community outlining the progress of Juvenile Court in reaching benchmarks of performance including: re-offense rates, community service hours ordered and completed, restitution owed and paid, drug and alcohol use among probationers, or similar measures of progress. The report will be disseminated through newspaper publications, brochures, and the internet.	\$20,000
